Prohibit extremist speakers and events in the schoo	The school exercises "due diligence" in relation to requests from external speakers and organisations using school premises.	<ul> <li>The Prevent Lead is identified on the central Safeguarding board and on posters around the school.</li> <li>Request an outline of what the speaker intends to cover.</li> <li>Research the person/organisation to establish whether they have demonstrated extreme views/actions. Deny permission for people/organisations to use</li> <li>school premises if they have links to extreme</li> <li>groups or movements.</li> <li>Provide justification for their decisions in writing.</li> <li>The speaker/ organisation would not be left alone with children.</li> </ul>	All staff- whoever is organising the event.
The school uses existing safeguarding arrangements in exercising its Prevent duty.	Staff record and report concerns in line with existing policies and procedures.	<ul> <li>All staff record and report concerns on the My Concern system. Paper 'Logging Concern Forms' are available in the unlikely event of the system being down.</li> <li>Records of referrals are kept in the Safeguarding / PREVENT File.</li> </ul>	ALL STAFF PREVENT LEAD
Referrals are made to relevant agencies where a Prevent concern is identified.	The Prevent Lead makes appropriate referrals to other agencies including Children's Social Care and Channel Panel.	<ul> <li>Prevent referrals are made to Children's Social Care. Tel. 0345 045 5203</li> <li>Advice may be sought regarding Prevent concerns by calling Cambridgeshire Police on 101 and selecting extension 2286 or 2595 or by email <u>Prevent@cambs.pnn.police.uk</u></li> <li>Referrals should be made using the LSCB Referral Form and the Exploitation Checklist should be completed.</li> <li>The Prevent lead supports the Channel process by sharing information and carrying out agreed actions.</li> </ul>	PREVENT LEAD DSL's
